



State Budget Brings Long Term Investments and New Challenges

ichigan's Fiscal Year 2025-26 budget, finalized in early October, represents one of the largest in state history at nearly 81 billion dollars. The spending plan delivers record per pupil funding for K-12 education, modest increases for higher education, and a new long term road funding framework aimed at addressing Michigan's infrastructure needs.

The transportation package, expected to raise roughly 1.8 billion dollars annually at full phase in, prioritizes local roads and includes updated fuel taxes, electric vehicle registration fees, and targeted transit investments. For the Lansing region, this creates opportunities to accelerate long delayed improvements and strengthen regional mobility.

The budget also calls for state departments to prioritize in person work and maintain up to 80 percent occupancy in government buildings, an important step toward revitalizing downtown Lansing's economy.

However, the plan also tightens funding for several employer driven programs. The Going PRO Talent Fund faces reductions, and no new deposits were made to the state's major incentive tool, the SOAR Fund. Additionally, revenue sharing to local governments remains flat.

The Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce will continue working with partners across the region to help employers leverage new infrastructure investments, advocate for restored training dollars, and ensure the Lansing area remains positioned for sustainable growth. •



Tailgaters has grown from a small donut shop on South Cedar Street into Greater Lansing's premier convenience destination, blending national favorites like Dunkin' and Sunoco with a hometown, family-owned brand. The Haddad family has been operating Dunkin' restaurants and gas stations in the Lansing market for more than 45 years, and their commitment to service, quality, and community has been central to their success.

The Tailgaters brand launched in 2019 by Chris Haddad and his family—son Jeff Haddad, daughter Danni and her husband Brad Schertzing, and daughter Ashley and her husband Steve Tomkovich—ushered in a new era,

reimagining stores with a broader footprint that expanded beyond coffee and fuel to full-service convenience destinations featuring open layouts, wide aisles, organized merchandising, and a focus on seamless guest experiences.




"I am really proud of my kids," said Chris Haddad, owner of Tailgaters. "Their involvement has helped shape the Tailgaters brand into what it is today. It's been rewarding to see their ideas and leadership guide the next generation of our family business." Today, Tailgaters serves neighborhoods in Okemos, DeWitt, Holt, and Delta Township, with a new location opening soon in Williamston. Each store employs between 50 and 60 people, creating a workforce of more than 200 across the region. Unlike many convenience stores and fueling stations owned by large national corporations, Tailgaters is locally rooted—ensuring that dollars spent here stay in Greater Lansing, supporting jobs and community growth.

By combining thoughtful expansion with a deep commitment to the community it serves, Tailgaters demonstrates how a locally rooted family business can make a meaningful and lasting difference, driving investment, creating opportunities, and fostering pride throughout the Greater Lansing region.

Ionetix Corporation: Advancing Life Sciences in Lansing

Founded in 2009, lonetix Corporation is a Lansing-based biotechnology company employing 70 people across 18 states. The company is expanding its operations with a new facility, investing \$25.75 million in the Lansing region and creating more than 53 new jobs.





produce medical isotopes, which are essential materials used in cancer detection and cardiac PET imaging. Its unique end-to-end approach integrates design, manufacturing, and on-site isotope production, enabling healthcare providers to offer faster, more precise, and more accessible care to patients.

The company is also advancing next-generation therapies, such as alpha-based treatments, which deliver targeted radiation directly to cancer cells while minimizing damage to healthy tissue. Ionetix is at the forefront of technology that enhances both the accuracy of diagnosis and the effectiveness of treatment.


lonetix creates high-tech jobs that blend science, engineering, and advanced manufacturing—from physicists and radiochemists to mechanical and electrical engineers—helping attract and retain top technical talent in the region.

Through investments in facilities, equipment, and workforce development, the company is strengthening mid-Michigan's reputation as a hub for innovation in nuclear medicine and life sciences.

"Being part of the Greater Lansing community means contributing to something larger than ourselves," said Dominica Palacio, Vice President of Administration, lonetix Corporation. "We are surrounded by forward-thinking businesses, strong educational institutions, and a collaborative spirit that supports growth and innovation. Lansing has been a great place to grow, and we are proud to represent this region on a national stage."



Ionetix is entering an exciting period of growth with its Alpha Therapy and Therapeutics facility in Lansing, which is nearing completion. This facility will play a critical role in developing and producing isotopes for next-generation cancer treatments, further advancing nuclear medicine technology. Locally developed innovations from Ionetix are improving lives across the country and demonstrate how science-based companies with integrated approaches can drive both economic growth and regional vitality.

McLaren Greater Lansing: Expanding Access to Care in Delta Township

McLaren Grand Ledge, a multidisciplinary medical campus and freestanding emergency department, represents a \$40 million investment in the Greater Lansing region. The facility is part of the McLaren Greater Lansing network, which serves Ingham, Eaton, and Clinton counties as part of the statewide McLaren Health Care system. Offering a wide range of patient-centered care—from primary care and preventive services to full-service emergency medicine—the new McLaren Grand Ledge facility brings healthcare directly to the community.



Austin Holcomb, McLaren Corporate Director of Design and Construction, noted some of the facility's highlights, including 17 private exam rooms, designated mental health safe rooms, and a sensory room for patients with autism. The campus delivers high-quality care nearby, reduces wait times, improves patient access and outcomes, and represents a significant investment in the region's economic vitality.

"The new freestanding emergency department in Delta Township is positioned to significantly enhance access to urgent healthcare services for local residents and surrounding communities," said Dr. Larisa Traill, Medical Director, McLaren Greater Lansing and McLaren Grand Ledge, Emergency Department. "The addition of this healthcare center aligns with McLaren's commitment to expanding its health system in the Lansing area, reinforcing

its mission to deliver comprehensive and accessible care to the community, ultimately improving the overall health landscape of the region."

Construction of the project created more than 100 local jobs, and the center has also added dozens of healthcare positions across emergency care, laboratory services, and primary care. By expanding convenient, accessible care, McLaren Grand Ledge demonstrates how targeted healthcare investments can strengthen both community health and regional economic growth.



Scheduled for completion in spring 2026, the Michigan State University Student Recreation and Wellness Center is a 293,000-square-foot facility on the south side of campus designed to support the health, wellness, and engagement of current and future Spartans. This \$200 million project will include gymnasiums, a turf arena, strength and fitness spaces, two classrooms, sports simulators, a 40-foot climbing wall, and a 50-meter pool. Sustainability and adaptability were central to the design, ensuring the space can evolve alongside the changing needs of the student population.



The vision for the facility was inspired by students, who advocated for, helped fund, and shaped the center. "Having a state-of-the-art recreation facility will help recruit and retain top Spartans and bring the university into competition

with the best programs in the Big Ten and nationally," said Marcus Jackson, Director of Recreational Sports and Fitness Services, Michigan State University. "A facility of this scale also enables MSU to host more events for the region, including club sports, athletic competitions, and conferences all contributing to the region's vitality."

The success of the region and the success of MSU are intertwined. The prosperity of Greater Lansing allows the university to attract the best students, staff, and faculty, who

in turn contribute to the region's growth and innovation. Bringing this ambitious project to life also created numerous construction jobs, supporting local trades and contractors while transforming the vision into reality.

Once complete, the Student Recreation and Wellness Center will offer a modern, adaptable, and inclusive space where Spartans can engage in physical activity, build friendships, and create lasting memories. By opening opportunities for community engagement, the facility will further strengthen MSU's connection to the region and enhance Greater Lansing's overall quality of life.

Strikeout Baseball: Revitalizing Youth Baseball in Lansing

Strikeout Baseball is a grassroots movement dedicated to bringing youth baseball back to the Lansing community, making the game accessible, fun, and free for all children. The organization features a miniature stadium where games can be played with as few as two participants and also offers free community clinics that teach baseball skills in a family-friendly environment.



Founded by Jeff Lazaros in 2019, the organization began when the City of Lansing gifted Strikeout Baseball a parcel of land that remains part of the city park system, ensuring the site is well-maintained and publicly accessible. Construction broke ground in 2020, and with the support of MLB Hall of Famer John Smoltz, the organization has inspired and nurtured young athletes throughout the region. The grand opening in June 2025 marked the realization of a vision to unite and empower the community through baseball. Strikeout Baseball has also gained national attention, including a feature on FOX's Baseball Night in America, for its innovative approach to inclusive and engaging youth sports.

"Strikeout Baseball is about more than the game—it's about building community, teaching teamwork, and giving kids a place to belong," said Jeff Lazaros, Founder, Strikeout Baseball. "We want to make baseball accessible to everyone, and by doing so, we're creating opportunities for youth across



Lansing to grow, learn, and be part of something bigger. This is just the beginning of what we hope will be a lasting impact on the region."

Strikeout Baseball goes beyond fostering community and youth development. Construction of the facilities supported local contractors and tradespeople, contributing to regional economic growth. Events hosted at the miniature stadium attract families and visitors, benefiting local businesses and will continue to reinforce Lansing as a destination for inclusive sports and recreational activities. •

s experienced designers in interior plantscape, we were delighted to immerse our team in new options to help clients who wanted to add indoor greenery, but did not have wonderful light, the budget for ongoing care, or who wanted a green effect in a seasonally utilized space.

Preserved mosses require no light, temperature control or watering! Because no care is needed, these art pieces are an easy investment to make while creating a beautiful biophilic space at home or at work.

Moss Walls have opened a panorama of possibilities for adding green impacts in indoor spaces. Preserved moss species, focusing on reindeer moss, available in many shades of green and other colors, gives a moss artist a broad palette to work with. Added elements can include dried fungi, manzanita vine, olivewood, preserved ferns, lotus pods, shells and stones. From a small personal photo frame-size wall to commercial applications on fire-retardant plywood sheets, moss wall art creates welcoming interior spaces. The color and textures awaken the senses and bring real joy.

Working with local artists is a great benefit, as these pieces require crating to ship. Staying local saves cost, time, and allows the artistic team to complete the

installation. Viewing a dry layout as a part of the process, the client can be part of the design process.

We began designing in this area about 15 years ago, and the demand continues. We have recreated business and university logos, nature themes, and interpreted other artwork. Our pieces have covered over 200 square feet, along with coordinating panels with a design running from panel to panel. Our in-house carpenters make and paint or stain the wood frames as needed. We have local partnerships for custom metal frames.

Larger commercial projects, often working with the general contractor, can create a background for corporate or institutional logos, or interpreting the logo in moss. A sign company would typically create and add the metal logo and lettering once the moss art is on the wall, but it can be added in the studio. We work across lower Michigan, collaborating with architects, designers, general contractors and directly with clients to develop the pieces needed to create a lasting interior green project. Our work can be seen across greater Lansing, and in Grand Rapids, Ann Arbor, and greater Detroit. •



One Big Beautiful Bill: What Businesses Should Prepare for in 2026

igned into law in July 2025, the One Big Beautiful Bill (OBBB) represents one of the most significant federal policy packages for business in nearly a decade. Supported by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the OBBB makes permanent many key provisions from the 2017 Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, providing long-term certainty and stability for employers across industries.

Among the most impactful changes are the permanent 20 percent Qualified Business Income (QBI) deduction for pass-through entities, 100 percent bonus depreciation for new equipment and property, and immediate expensing of research and development costs. These measures are designed to strengthen cash flow, spur investment, and encourage innovation, particularly for small and mid-sized companies.

The bill also enhances employee-related tax incentives, including permanent tax credits for paid leave, expanded credits for childcare, and tax-free student loan repayment

contributions. For the manufacturing sector, new depreciation rules and investment credits are expected to drive domestic production growth.

As businesses look to 2026, preparation should focus on strategic tax planning, updating capital investment schedules, reviewing employee benefit structures, and exploring manufacturing incentives and Opportunity Zone projects. While some sectors may face challenges due to reduced clean energy credits and new trade policies, the overall impact of the OBBB positions American businesses and the Lansing region for renewed economic growth and competitiveness. •



For Kate McNerney, a love of service began at an early age. Inspired by her grandfathers' military service and a visit to see the Blue Angels in Traverse City at age 11, McNerney knew she wanted to serve others. That calling led her to the University of Michigan in 2001, where she joined the US Air

Force Reserve Officer Training Corps, later commissioning into the US Air Force in 2005. She went on to serve with the Ohio Air National Guard, completing combat deployments in Iraq (2007) and Afghanistan (2008), before joining the Michigan Air National Guard and eventually separating in 2021.

Her military experience instilled key leadership values that continue to guide her today:

"Doing the right thing even when no one is looking is essential," McNerney explains. "In the military, you needed to be trusted to do what you said you would do. Teamwork, accountability, and showing up with a positive attitude are irreplaceable values I carry into my work. If you do your best, you never close doors."

At Chick-fil-A Saginaw, McNerney channels that dedication into the business and the Greater Lansing community. Over the past nine years, the restaurant has donated more than \$1 million in food to the City Rescue Mission, Greater Lansing Food Bank, and House of Promise. Her commitment also extends to


